Please RSVP your place at either date so that we can have materials prepared (central@cccdisciples.org or 217-428-4336). You need not come to both sessions.



"Prepared Through Past and Present"

God uses our past to prepare us for our future. This thought has been stirring in my mind since I began preparing for last Sunday's sermon. Our theme was the prophet Joel. We know that Joel was a temple prophet. He spoke God's Word in the context of worship in the temple, the house of God. We also know about Joel's father. He is mentioned in Joel 1:1. Moreover, we know his *name*! He is called "Pethuel." That simple fact alone is compelling. Of all the people the Bible mentions, an exceedingly small fraction of them are *named*. To be named, therefore, is to be designated as important. It is as though, in referring to Pethuel by name, scripture acknowledges him to be a person of respect and renown in the temple community.

The name Pethuel itself means "Yahweh is my God" or "worshipper of Yahweh," which may further indicate *why* Pethuel was important in the temple community. The name suggests that he was tremendously devoted in his piety and worship of Yahweh. This is underscored by the fact that he named his son "Joel," which also means some version of the phrase "Yahweh is God." Thus, Joel was raised by a father who would have gone out of his way to take Joel with him to the temple. He likely would have instilled in him a respect for and understanding of the importance of worship. For his part, Joel would have grown up knowing the ancient liturgies; the sounds of the chanting priests and the fragrance of the burning incense; appreciating the rites and rituals of the faith. As he was the son of a respected man in the temple hierarchy, he could very well have been a respected young man himself as he grew from childhood to adulthood.

When God finally did designate him to be a prophet, it would have made perfect sense. Being known and respected by his community, the chance the community would *listen* to Joel bring the Word of God to them was high. As Joel was growing up, he may not have been cognizant of how God was shaping him for his future work and ministry, but God was, nonetheless, for *God uses our past and present to prepare us for our future.*

I believe this is true for us in a variety of situations. God can use our past and present moments of suffering and hardship to prepare us for a future in which we may be used to bring comfort and hope to others facing their own struggles. St. Ignatius of Loyola (Spain), writing nearly 500 years ago, said that God never *causes* our suffering but sometimes *allows* us to suffer to prepare us for a greater future purpose. Now, it is never our prerogative to determine for others *when* God might be allowing us to suffer for a greater purpose. To do so would be condescending at best and sadistic at worst, but I can see in my own life how things that I have experienced as suffering would later turn out to be things I drew upon as I offered pastoral encouragement to others. *God uses our past and present to prepare us for our future*.

In more benign ways, the same holds true. One interesting aspect of being a minister for the past 21 years is that I have always been around high school youth. What's more, I will have two in high school this coming year. One thing that has never changed about youth – from my generation to the youth of the last two-plus decades – is how they will wonder "Why should I take such-and-

such a class in school? I will never use it in my life in the future!" Granted, once calculus is completed, we may never actually use the formula that determines that area under a curve, and unless we are in a trivia game, knowing the order of the Chinese Dynasties or Roman Emperors may never be something that directly benefits us, and yet, in my own life – my parents never encouraged me toward ministry as much as they emphasized the importance of taking math in school (they were both biostatisticians, so... Duh?). A solid math background teaches critical reasoning skills, and what is preaching (at times) but explicating the theological arguments made in scripture in a reasoned, critical way, and though a history major in college, I never took a Middle Eastern history class, yet my interest in history in general spawned an increased interest in geography and ancient languages, which directly impacts how I think, teach, and preach in my current life as a minister, because *God uses our past and present to prepare us for our future*.

The challenge for us is to be fully open and responsive to every present moment – whether it be something we consider "negative" (painful), "positive" (joyful), or "neutral," for we never know how God might use our past and present to prepare us for our future, but by faith, we believe God will.
