Minister's Article

"More than Bricks and Mortar"

Even while the Notre Dame cathedral in Paris spewed forth smoke and flames from between its spires and flying buttresses, there was resolute determination to rebuild the edifice, and within days of the devastating fire, massive amounts of funding was donated for that very purpose. So it is with some of our cherished church buildings. When damaged, we repair them. In related fashion, the church in which I was raised was, and is, located on the University of Michigan's campus. Built in 1891, it came to occupy prime real estate as the university grew and expanded. When the Law School desired more room to expand at the beginning of the last century, Memorial Christian Church was meticulously deconstructed stone by stone, with each item identified and numbered. Materials were then transported two blocks away and reconfigured exactly as they had been at the previous location, so valuable was the building to the people.

In the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina that ravaged the Gulf Coast in 2005, an article was printed in the Baton Rogue daily newspaper about a small church in Amite, LA, revolving around the church's steeple. It seems that during Hurricane Betsy in 1965, the winds knocked the steeple to the ground. As part of the recovery process, the church members repaired it to stand tall again. Four years later, however, Hurricane Camille knocked the steeple down once more. Yet once again, the members rallied to raise the steeple once more. In 1974, Hurricane Carmen did the same thing, whereupon the members again repaired the damaged steeple. Sure enough, Hurricane Katrina brought the steeple down a fourth time and once again, as the article described, this small community of faith was determined to make their steeple stand again — their perseverance greater than a storm's ability to shake it.

Other times, however, a damaged building is left in ruin. Toward the end of World War II, the allies destroyed virtually all of the major urban centers in Germany. This, several years after the Germans severely bombed major parts of Europe. As a result of this destruction from both sides, thousands of churches were destroyed. In at least several cities in nearly every country in western Europe, a bombed-out church has been left in its "ruined and rubbled" state while a rebuilt society has sprung up around it. One such church is the Kaiser Wilhelm "Gedaechtniskirche" in Berlin. It has been meant to stand as a memorial – and warning – to future generations not to repeat the atrocities of the past.

There are also debates about the importance of church buildings in general. When the First Christian Church of Baton Rouge, LA, bought property on the outskirts of town in the early 1960s, an all-purpose building was quickly erected that served as both a sanctuary and a fellowship hall. In time, as the congregation grew, smaller buildings were added to the campus — a nursery, along with classroom and office buildings. Twenty years later, and with the congregation now quite large, discussion was held about building an "official sanctuary." Ultimately the congregation decided to do so, but the debates were fierce. Many protested a building, insisting that the monies spent could be better used for missions and outreach.

The larger point is that all of these illustrations involving church buildings are about more than the bricks and mortar – they are about how our sacred places represent our strongest memories and our deepest convictions; our more heartfelt resolutions and our commitment to our core values. All of this was introduced by the command by God through the prophets to rebuild the temple in Jerusalem. After the Judean people returned from exile and captivity in Babylon, they were to rebuild the temple that that Babylonians destroyed over 60 years earlier. Not only would this give them a place to worship, it would represent their commitment to keep their relationship with God at the forefront of their lives. Of course, there is always a danger that we end up worshipping the buildings we create in God's name more than the God who gave us the ability to erect the building in the first place. But buildings have always been – and always will be – important ways we understand our faith. In whatever state they exist, they reveal our desire to live by faith and to make the ministry and mission of that faith the greatest priority in our lives.
